We've had some joyous news as well, with the placement of a newborn foster daughter with Katy and Anders, and once again, our community has stepped forward with baby gear and food and help for the new parents. It is a joy to be part of this community.

And this community offers us sustenance as we make sense of the wrenching news happening elsewhere. Our values of Standing on the Side of Love teach us to stand with those who are marginalized. Time and time again, I am encouraged by communities who have come together in the wake of tragedy, such as after the shootings at Sandy Hook, and then the terrorist attack in Boston recently. Boston is pulling together in a beautiful and inspiring way, with restaurants feeding stranded runners, and people who have just finished running 26.2 miles, running another two to get to the hospital and donate blood. I am beyond frustrated that many senators can not come together in the same spirit to pass common sense gun legislation.

Let us both teach our children, and remind ourselves, not only that the Spirit of Life is in the helpers not in the tragedy, but that we can be the helpers.

mission is "To prevent incarceration and reduce recidivism primarily among Native American women and men. To provide assistance for individuals released from jails and prisons, who are working on creating a better life for themselves, their children, and communities."

## Giving to Wy'east directly from your IRA

Will you be 70 1/2 by the end of the year? Do you have an IRA? Do you want to take a tax deduction for your pledge to Wy'east but don't have enough deductions to itemize, or have just barely enough to itemize? You probably already know that you are going to have to take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD in IRS speak) from your IRA. You may not know that the IRS has extended the Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) tax break to the end of 2013. I didn't. It works like this: You arrange for your IRA administrator to pay your pledge directly to Wy'east (or other tax exempt organization). That distribution then becomes tax exempt. In effect, you get a charitable deduction even if you don't itemize deductions on your 2013 tax return. Neat, huh? Any questions? Contact Barbara S-T; I'm at church most Sundays.

## Generational Shift and Congregational Vitality Study

Wy'east, along with other UU congregations, has been invited to participate in a research project exploring the impact of current shifts in generational configuration within our congregations on congregational vitality. Researcher Rev. Dr. Linda Weaver Horton, currently minister of the Unitarian Fellowship of Kelowna, BC, has undertaken this study as a Sabbatical project, drawing upon her former training and experience as a social scientist. She has served on the UUA Commission on Appraisal, and was a primary author of their report "Engaging our Theological Diversity" in 2005.

Many congregations are challenged as older generations are aging out of active participation in the leadership, volunteering and financial support of our religious communities. Most have depended heavily upon the culture of commitment to church life characteristic of what is now the eldest generation, in particular their commitment to create and hold community and to take responsibility for mentoring younger generations. Wy'east is a great role model for how a small congregation can be fully intergenerational, so your participation is particularly helpful! 10 of you have contributed questionnaires so far; 25 or 30 could tell us some interesting things about this congregation.

Given the accelerated rate of change in our world, our vitality as a religious movement depends more than ever upon becoming allies across generations in order to live out our mission in the world. What is learned from this study could help our denomination, as well as participating congregations, to better understand this dynamic and enhance congregational vitality.

To participate in this study, members of your congregation are invited to complete a questionnaire, and perhaps host generational focus groups (there is a process guide available). Copies of the questionnaire are on the literature table, or can be requested in e-form from Rev. Horton. 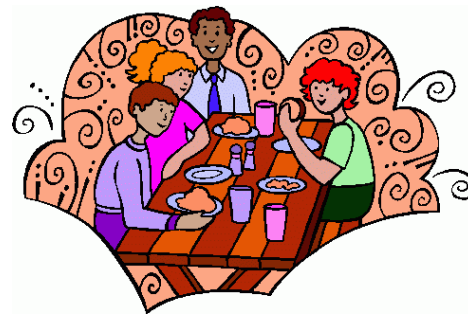
