WRITTEN OFFERINGS – from Rev. Craig Moro

Last month we held our Charter Sunday celebration. It was more than a nostalgic review of the past twenty years. There was also sense of discovery. Seeing where we began, and all that has proceeded from the choices that we made! Yes, we meet in a different building from where we started out. The building is not what matters. You can see this from the very name our founders chose: Wy'east Unitarian Universalist Congregation. Not "Fellowship" or "Society" or "Church", but *Congregation*. It's a name that invites newcomers from any religious background—or from none at all.

"Church" is closely associated with a specifically Christian form of worship in most people's minds. "Congregation" may carry less baggage. For some folks coming from a Christian background the word "church" holds negative memories and may be an impediment to visiting, much less staying on. For those with roots in a Jewish, Muslim, Buddhist or Hindu setting, visiting or joining a "church" might suggest renunciation of a whole religious past and the loss of one's place within it.

But to associate oneself with the Unitarian Universalist movement is not a matter of "conversion." Rather, it is a process of <u>polishing</u> the treasures we bring from our earlier spiritual journeys or past religious homes. (*Continued on page 2*)

Wy'east Social Justice Committee Looking for New Members

The Social Justice Committee consists of people from the congregation who want to further the social justice work of Wy'east. The congregation already does a lot with our support of the Village Support Network and the monthly homeless family dinners during the winter. What the Committee adds are monthly special collections and guest speakers, coordinated around the annual social justice theme, which was Housing Justice this year. How does this magic happen? The magic is the Social Justice Committee.

How is it accomplished? Each year a social justice theme is chosen by the congregation, and our proposed theme for next year is Women. Individuals on the Committee contact groups that focus on the theme, to better understand their missions and goals. We discuss the possibility of their participation as either being a special collection recipient or providing us with one of the five guest speakers we have on the theme every year. We learn a lot about these local groups, and they are very grateful in being considered. When we have them speak during our services, Wy'east gets a chance to learn about many various

organizations, and we help worthy causes that serve our community as well as the wider world. We have been averaging more than \$400 every month in the special collections that we raise for these groups. And something we're looking forward to in the future is having more that just a one month connection with a couple of these groups a year.

So, what do you think? Would you like to join us on the Social Justice Committee and be a part of the magic? Membership is free. Come to our meeting on May 7th, the first Sunday of the month, at 9:00 AM. We are looking forward to seeing you there.

May: JOIN

JOIN exists to support the efforts of homeless individuals and families to transition off the streets and into permanent housing. We envision a community where homelessness, if it exists at all, is a short-term circumstance rather

than a long-term or chronic condition. Since hiring our first Outreach Worker in 1998, JOIN has helped over 5,000 men, women, and children transition out of homelessness and into the safety of permanent housing. JOIN works with individuals and families sleeping on the streets in the city of Portland without regard to race, ethnicity, religion, age, gender, family status, sexual orientation, disability, or diagnosis. JOIN houses an average of 500 individuals each year from 250 households. JOIN's Outreach Services Program is designed to address the systemic need for greater service accessibility and to re-engage homeless people in positive processes of change. It is founded upon the efforts of 6 outreach workers who visit campsites, meal sites, and other places that homeless people gather out on the street. They develop personal relationships, provide ongoing support, and engage homeless people in processes of positive personal change that lead to successful and sustainable transitions off the street. Basic services such as showers, laundry, and personal storage are provided at JOIN's facility within the context of a barter exchange system. This system promotes individual dignity by allowing participants to earn and select the service they need. Additional services include personal hygiene items, sleeping bags and blankets, contact address and telephone number, mail, bus tickets, and Oregon ID. Outreach services emphasize transitions out of homelessness and into permanent housing. Specifically this means helping to secure benefits or employment that will enable the payment of rent and supporting housing searches with funding for application fees and move-in deposits. We stay involved with people for at least 12 months and will provide limited funds for housing retention services for those people with whom we have been working.

In 2010 the CCC launched a comprehensive leadership development initiative, called Bridges, driven by the Coalition's values of honoring culturalspecificity while also building



a multicultural movement for collective action. Our mission is to significantly expand the capacity of our communities to self-organize, network, build culturallyspecific social capital, and provide leadership within and outside communities of color. Bridges houses six culturally-specific leadership development programs led by CCC member organizations and provides ongoing support through leadership placements, mentorship and community networking. Over 300 graduates are now part of a growing network of community leaders throughout Oregon and Southwest Washington. We are committed to this work in the long-term and recognize that meaningfully changing the face of leadership in Oregon is a multi-generational effort. In order to achieve our shared policy goals, we are committed to: building the capacity of communities and organizations of color to successfully advance policy agendas; reforming policy practices to ensure authentic community engagement of the communities most directly impacted by policy change; shifting discourses to centralize the voices of communities of color in policy conversations; and building partnerships and coalitions with allied individuals and organizations.

Wy'east Annual Meeting

The **2017 Annual Meeting** of the members of Wy'east will be after the Sunday service on **May 21**, following a brief time for coffee and snacks. Items on the agenda include: election of board members and nominating committee members for the upcoming year; approval of the proposed budget for the upcoming year; selection of the social justice theme for the upcoming year; approval of the minutes of the meetings of the congregation in the past year; and an annual report of the activities of the congregation.

Two weeks before the Annual Meeting, on May 7, we will have a congregational conversation to discuss the budget that will be considered at the Annual Meeting. This is when our treasurer – D'On this year – summarizes our financial situation as the current fiscal year ends and presents a draft budget for the next fiscal year for discussion. Based on the discussion at this meeting, D'On may revise the draft budget so that the board can recommend a budget to be voted on at the annual meeting. This meeting also follows a brief time for coffee and snacks after the service.

Anyone who has been a member of Wy'east for more than 30 days and who has made a contribution of money, material, or labor in the past 15 months is entitled to vote at a congregational meeting, except members under 18 years of age, who may not vote on the budget. Wy'east's bylaws provide for both voting by absentee ballot and designating a proxy to act on a member's behalf at a meeting. Absentee ballots will be available at church on May 7 and May 14, or you can contact me to email you an absentee ballot. To designate someone as your proxy, give them a signed proxy form (also available at church on May 7 and 14) prior to the meeting, authorizing them to act as your proxy. A member is allowed to serve as proxy for up to six other members.

Non-member friends are welcome to attend both meetings and participate in the discussion, but voting is a privilege of membership.

Our fifth principle: "The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large," reminds us that participating in the governance of Wy'east is religious work. I hope to see you at our meetings in May.
