Traditionally, we stop at an all-night diner, eat breakfast afterwards, then head home and go back to sleep for a while. We look forward to this every year.

This year, for the first time, Katie, Duncan and Devin joined us. It was somewhat cloudy, but we each

managed to see a few. It marked the beginning of an opening of the ritual to include the expanded family.

This is what rituals are--or what they should be. They expand to include



new people. They're wonderful even when they're not perfect. Some years, the stars don't cooperate. We still enjoy lying on sleeping bags on the grass and looking up at the sky. Some years, the best part is what happens before or afterwards, like going home at dawn and seeing a mama raccoon and her three babies walking down our street.

Church rituals are similar. We need to not be locked into what they're supposed to look like. We need to let them expand and shift to include new people, honoring what these folks bring to the table. We need to remember that the underlying purpose of worship, and of all we do together, is to build community, support one another and those in the wider community, create a more just world and welcome the Holy. May it be so.

There's an app for that

Illuminations, the Unitarian Universalist Association's (UUA's) first app is now available for free in the iTunes App Store and Google Play.

Illuminations has over 350 Inspirational Words, a Chalice Lighter with several chalice options, and a Seven Principles Guide in English and Spanish, along with examples of the Principles in action.

The Chalice Lighter comes with five chalice designs. Tap the screen to light it and tap it again to extinguish the flame. Alternatively you can blow, near the microphone, to extinguish the flame. The 'blow' feature can be disabled if you are using the chalice lighter in noisy environments and are having trouble keeping it lit.

All of the Inspirational Words and the Seven Principles can be shared via Facebook, Twitter, and email allowing you to inspire your friends.

By default the app will deliver Timely Words to your notification bar each day. You can disable this feature or change the frequency in the settings menu.

Helping a Homeless Family

A team of 6 Wy'east women (Amy, Barbara, Diane, Mabel, Mary, Carol) and Tricie from a Presbyterian Church in Tigard are working under the auspices of the Village Support Network to assist and support a young family that has recently been homeless. Our family is Savanna and her 2 little boys and another one on the way (in fact due early September). We have met with her several times, getting acquainted and discussing some of the challenges in her life. The first issue was to gather some of the essentials she needed to set up a home after being homeless for a period of time.

Thanks to the extraordinary generosity of the Wy'east community and all the team members, we helped Savanna host a housewarming party on August 4th, and we were able to bring 3 carloads of donated items, including: baking pans and baking staples, a blender, toilet paper, hangers, laundry soap, cleaning supplies, new baby supplies, a carseat (a very lucky garage sale find!), a sewing machine with a small amount of basic sewing supplies, a bookshelf unit and piles of children's books and toys. Among the most imaginative contributions were the means to develop and display family photos and handsewn curtains for the boys' room. Marsha's old (and exceedingly heavy) couch/sofabed has found a new life as a basic necessity in this active family's living room. The team and Savanna offer the most heartfelt thanks to everyone in the Wy'east community who contributed something. Every single thing was most definitely needed and sincerely appreciated.

Savanna has some challenges related to her driver's license and car insurance, and these are being resolved as we work together. With the help of a very generous \$350 anonymous donation, we were able to make the first payments to get her set up with car insurance. She has worked as a house cleaner before and has commitments from family and friends to do housecleaning to help pay the insurance costs. She has a car and wants to be able to drive so she can sign up for the chef/restaurant work training program that the Village Support Network runs. If she can complete that, there is a good chance it will lead to a job.

The next big milestones in her life will be the birth of her baby in September and then trying to get some training so that she can find work.

That's why we'll be hosting multiple RE meetings in the coming weeks, as well as sending out a survey to ask parents, guardians, and children what they'd like to focus on this year. Check your inbox—we'll send email reminders about the meetings and survey.

It's going to be a wonderful year—we'll be organizing opportunities for the kids to hang out with each other outside of Wy'east, we're working with nearby congregations to offer an Our Whole Lives program (part of the UU sexuality education curricula) to our middle schoolers, and we'll be having a lot of fun. We hope you'll join us!

September: Portland Jobs with Justice

"Portland Jobs with Justice is a coalition of more than 95 labor organizations and community groups dedicated to protecting the rights of working people and supporting community struggles to build a more just society. We are committed to: the creation of family wage jobs, support for organizing both here and abroad, support for community economic and civil rights struggles, and maintaining pressure to demand corporate accountability in our communities. We are also committed to creating an organization that is antiracist and fully inclusive and welcoming to everyone."

One of the projects of Portland Jobs with Justice is the Portland Area Workers' Rights Board. "The Workers' Rights Board is a public forum where workers can bring complaints against employers for violating their human and legal rights in the workplace. The Board is drawn from a broad spectrum of community leaders and can intervene with employers and the public to help resolve situations that threaten workers' rights. The Board believes that it is especially important to support the efforts of low wage workers, who tend to be women, immigrants, young workers, and workers of color, to achieve justice in the workplace. Safe, living wage jobs, where workers are not discriminated against for speaking up for their rights, are the backbone of any healthy community. Workers' Rights Boards currently exist in thirteen cities across the country." http://www.jwjpdx.org

October: McKenzie River Gathering

"McKenzie River Gathering Foundation has given out over \$12 million in grants since 1976. MRG Foundation pools money from Oregon's progressive community and distributes it back to grassroots groups working on a wide range of social change issues. MRG funding supports the most strategic work unfolding at the local level to address globalization, poverty, war, racism and environmental destruction. We currently provide well over half a million dollars in funding to progressive organizations a year. MRG Foundation's grassroots grantmaking is unique. We recruit our board and grantmaking committee members from the communities we serve throughout Oregon. With the direct knowledge these grantmakers bring, we are able to respond to new ideas and fresh thinking. MRG Foundation makes grants that other foundations may view as 'risky' but are often funding years later. Using our grassroots grantmaking process, we have been an early funder on key issues including HIV/AIDS, domestic violence, immigration, and globalization." http://www.mrgfoundation.org
