### From the Minister + + +

I held off writing this column, because I was going to a clergy lunch today with members of the Oregon New Sanctuary Movement (oregonsanctuary.org). The organization is an interfaith group working for justice for immigrants living in the US, with the belief that "everyone, regardless of national origin, has basic common rights, including but not limited to: 1) livelihood; 2) family unity; and 3) physical and emotional safety." I was excited to network with other religious people in the city around our work this year on immigrants and refugees.

But instead, as I was on the way to lunch, I got a phone call from my daughter at school, saying she was sick, and could I come pick her up? This, as much as anything, illustrates the working parent dilemma. For me, it's how do I balance ministry and the needs of my children? Many of you have similar issues with balancing work and family. I know it's a tricky line sometimes, and I struggle occasionally with feeling like my own issues mean that I'm not always as available as I'd like to be to you all.

### From the Minister (continued)

And yet, in a later conversation today, I realized that really, I think it's helpful to be able to model a work/life balance that works for both the congregation and my family. As a person who single parents half the time, I have big chunks of time without my kids, and I enjoy being able to focus on my work at Wy'east during this time. And certainly, most days, I'm able to balance work and home successfully. But when the interesting church thing I was looking forward to gets interrupted by the call from the school nurse that my child is vomiting and needs to go home now, well, family took precedence.

I've enjoyed meeting individually with several new members, and one of the most meaningful questions I ask is, "what pastoral care needs do you think you might have?" I've heard about aging parents and worries about children and many other issues. It's led to some rich conversations with folks. I'm grateful to know what's going on in your lives. Some of these conversations will be background for us as you approach me with pastoral care issues later. Others will simply be one of many good conversations we have.

And while your relationship with me is inherently different, because I work for you all, I still appreciate that you care about what's going on in my life, and that, when appropriate, you care for me the same way you'd care for any other member of the community. We've got a rockin' team of movers, I have to say! And, while it is never a congregation's job to take care of their minister, my hope is that by knowing just a bit about my life makes you feel more comfortable sharing your own with me. And after all, isn't that what community is about?

### RESTAURANT ADVENTURE

After our service on the **fourth Sunday** of each month, those who are interested gather for lunch at a local restaurant. It is an opportunity for lively and topical conversation, and for enjoying the bounty of wonderful restaurant food available in Portland.

Our group varies in size from as few as four to as many as 15, and often includes both adults and children. We announce the month's destination during the service, gather a list of interested congregants, and then call ahead to make reservations.

We try to find places with a variety of moderately priced vegetarian and omnivorous menu items. We have some regular stops on the rotation, and we're always on the lookout for new restaurants to try.

### Small Groups at Wy'east

Wy'east has recently introduced a number of small groups, or Chalice Circles. They are open to members and non-members of the congregation, and meet once or more a month. When they were originally proposed, it was thought the groups might only attract interest for a few months, however, nearly all of them have continued to meet. The leadership of these circles can be flexible, and ideas for new groups are always welcome.

Below is a list of the groups that Wy'east is currently running:

### ENVIRONMENT:

This group endeavors to create environmental stewardship in the congregation and the community. It meets at Hollywood Senior Center after service, at approximately noon, on the first and third Sundays. The group has planned some topics for discussion and lined up speakers from community organizations to explore how our congregation can get involved in local actions. Contact Hank H.

### CRAFTS:

This group meets every second Saturday of the month at 1pm in a private residence. All crafts are welcome to be worked on individually, or shared/taught, and some group collaborative projects are being planned. Contact Robin K.

### MEDITATION:

This group's purpose is to practice guided meditation. Meets on alternate Wednesdays from 7-8 pm at a private residence. Contact Gina O.

### SOCIAL JUSTICE:

This group has been meeting to develop projects in which the whole congregation, including our children, can participate. We are interested in: food security, women's shelter, racism, immigrant rights, gay rights, marriage equality, environmental justice, volunteering to help people, and continuing the work that Wy'east already does. Some ideas have already been implemented, such as collecting food and children's books for a community organization working with Hispanic families, and providing essentials that can't be bought with food stamps to newly arriving refugees. Future projects will center around the above interest areas. Contact Mark A.

### PARENTING:

This group is a traditional chalice circle discussing parenthood and the family, and meets on the 2nd Tuesday of the month at Debra T's home. Meetings run about ninety minutes and include a lighting of the chalice, check in, reading, people speaking from the heart with no cross talk, and closing words. The second half of the time will be a general discussion. Drop-ins are welcome--we recognize how hard it is to make a time commitment. Contact Debra T.

### SENIORS:

This group's purpose is establishing deeper relationships among its members and supporting the congregation through social events and discussions. Meets to discuss issues related to aging and community, and to enjoy events together. Contact Hank H.
