## Going Deeper

Summer has finally arrived in Portland! After a spring with little springing, we're finally starting to get some warm air. Spring blossoms are gone, but the green of the trees remain. One of the reasons I fell in love with my new apartment was the amazing trees outside. One in particular bloomed right outside my back window, and punctuating the grass off my back patio is the most astounding root system. One root of this tree stretches out, visible above the grass, nearly the entire 20 feet of yard between my apartment and the back fence, making the most beautiful pattern.

I remember my daughter coming home from school after learning that trees go as deeply into the earth as they are visible above the ground. It gives a whole new sense of the world, doesn't it? We don't live in an area with subways, but still, we have sewers and root systems and power lines and the big dig—all under our feet—hidden under what we do see. The world doesn't stop with the visible.

And neither do our lives. A wise person said, “We never know what unbearable burdens other people are carrying, so let us be gentle with one another.” This is a good reminder for us, especially in church.

Sometimes, people come in through our doors because they’re full of unbelievable joy, like the couple that was looking for a minister to marry them. But sometimes people are a bit lost—seeking an anchor, or a community during a difficult time.

And sometimes, after we’ve been at Wy’east a while, we start seeking something more. Maybe it’s a new way to be involved. Perhaps you’re looking to deepen your connection with our community? Maybe it’s a new depth of spiritual practice you’re looking for?

Summer can be a good time to explore a new level of involvement here. The folks on our connections committee can help you connect with a new volunteer opportunity. Summer can be a great time to try out a new job: greeting or ushering, set up or take down, volunteering to be with our kids in Wy’camp some Sunday. Our membership connections committee: Tode Oshin, Ardis Bay Laurel, Mabel Poole and Hank and Betty Hadaway can help connect you with a role.

## From the Board...

After 4 years on the Wy'east Board of Trustees, my term of service is ending. Partly, it's a relief. The Board discusses, debates, struggles with, and works on every part of Wy'east such as debating our mission in the wider world, discussing where Wy'east should meet, reviewing our religious education program, checking our voice mail and deciding whether we need a Yellow Pages ad.

I will, however, also miss being on the Board. Nearly every Board meeting I attended was a gratifying experience of listening, sharing, struggling, commiserating and supporting each other. We had difficult conversations with respect. We planned and budgeted to the best of our ability under circumstances that were often challenging. We laughed, we ate many varieties of snacks, and we drank many gallons of tea. Always, always, we took seriously our responsibility to be good stewards of Wy'east and the funds entrusted to us by members and friends. That's what "trustee" means, and we always remembered that. I am grateful to have spent time with all my fellow Board members.

I am even more grateful that after two years as Treasurer, Wy'east has had two balanced budgets that did not use up our small savings, and we head into a new year with a (gasp!) surplus, which could help us weather the next economic downturn. Even better, I am so very grateful for the generosity of the Wy'east community during our recent canvass, which allowed us to surpass our goal of bringing Marcia to 1/3 time and instead move her to 4/10 time. Yay for us!

As I said at the Annual Meeting, the last 2 years required the Board to be budget-cutting fiscal conservatives, and it was very difficult and scary. We struggled with existential issues: Why does Wy'east exist? Why do we spend our money on Wy'east?

I've always believed that a place like Wy'east is needed for people who want a religious home that encourages intellectual curiosity and spiritual growth and does it all with sincere compassion.

My work on the Board is nearly done, but there will be other ways for me to take part in the work of Wy'east. The work of defending the inherent worth and dignity of everyone is never done. The work of encouraging everyone's spiritual journey and religious education is

never done. Respecting and protecting the democratic process is never done. Remembering that our lives depend on our planet's health, and that we need to use energy and resources more wisely is never done.

This is all sacred work. I've often thought that modern Unitarian Universalism is a very American idea: people from different backgrounds coming together, respecting each other's views, believing that we are stronger and better together than on our own. May it be so at Wy'east.

## Wy'east Special Collections

For the two months of July and August, our Special Collection is going to the **UUA/UUSC Japan Relief Fund**. Below is part of a notice that was sent to us about it.

### Help Our Partners in Japan

Following the devastating earthquake and resulting tsunamis in Japan, the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) and the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) established the UUA/UUSC Japan Relief Fund. UUA President Peter Morales issued a statement in which he said, "We, at the UUA, will hold the country of Japan in our hearts, as we work to support them in their time of great need." Our partners, including Risho Kosei-kai, Tsubaki Grand Shrine, the Konko Church of Izuo, the Tokyo Dojin Church, and the Japan Chapter of the International Association for Religious Freedom, are all in discernment about the specific efforts they will be taking to support recovery work, and the UUA and the UUSC will walk with them in the directions that are ultimately chosen. Please join with Unitarian Universalists (UUs) throughout the United States by contributing to the UUA/UUSC Japan Relief Fund.

## Love Did Guide Us

It's July now, and that means our Religious Education program has transformed itself into Wy'camp – our summer break mode where we give our teachers some time off, and put away our charts and schedules. We'll be taking turns hanging out with our children on Sunday mornings crafting our own classes. We may read books, we may dance or sing – mostly we'll be celebrating our time together with our younger congregants.

We closed off this learning year with a wonderful plant sale to benefit the children's program. We planted seeds back in April in celebration of Earth Day. Some seeds were purchased, but many came free from the Northeast and Southeast seed banks! In our planting, the children gathered together to share their heartfelt wishes for their seeds to emerge from the darkness and into the light. Each child took her/his seeds home to nurture, and then brought them back in June for the sale. These small sprouts successfully raised over \$100, a fact two of our children celebrated with jumping and shouting.



While I am personally excited about the summer months ahead, there are also some questions about what will happen when we return in the fall. We'll have quite a different program by then I think. Firstly, we will no longer have our regular childcare provider, Anne S. Anne has been caring for the youngest of our children since September of 2008. This June she graduated from her education program, and is currently waiting to see what graduate program she will be attending in the fall. Anne gave us her every Sunday for three years!

I believe she stayed with us not for the paycheck, but for the love of the children. She will be around for part of the summer, so there is still time for us to say thank you and good luck. And we will have a new person on board by fall.

Secondly, I will no longer be part of the RE Committee after this summer. I took over chairing RE two years ago. I first learned to work with our Director of Religious Education (DRE), and then later worked without one. I've been blessed to have had such wonderful support, teachers, and children. I'll be shifting my concentration to moderating the Board of Trustees, where I'll continue to support this program. But the RE Committee will have a new chair, and hopefully a few new members by fall. Please join in!

Finally, in the next few weeks we'll begin discussing how a new part-time DRE may fit into our program, helping us to continue growing and shifting to meet the needs of our children.

So although there are questions, I am also reassured. We will have many of the same teachers and children to keep continuity. During our plant sale I saw again how this congregation gathers together to work with our smaller congregants. Even though the *Love Will Guide Us* curriculum is completed, I know our Love for this RE program will continue.
